

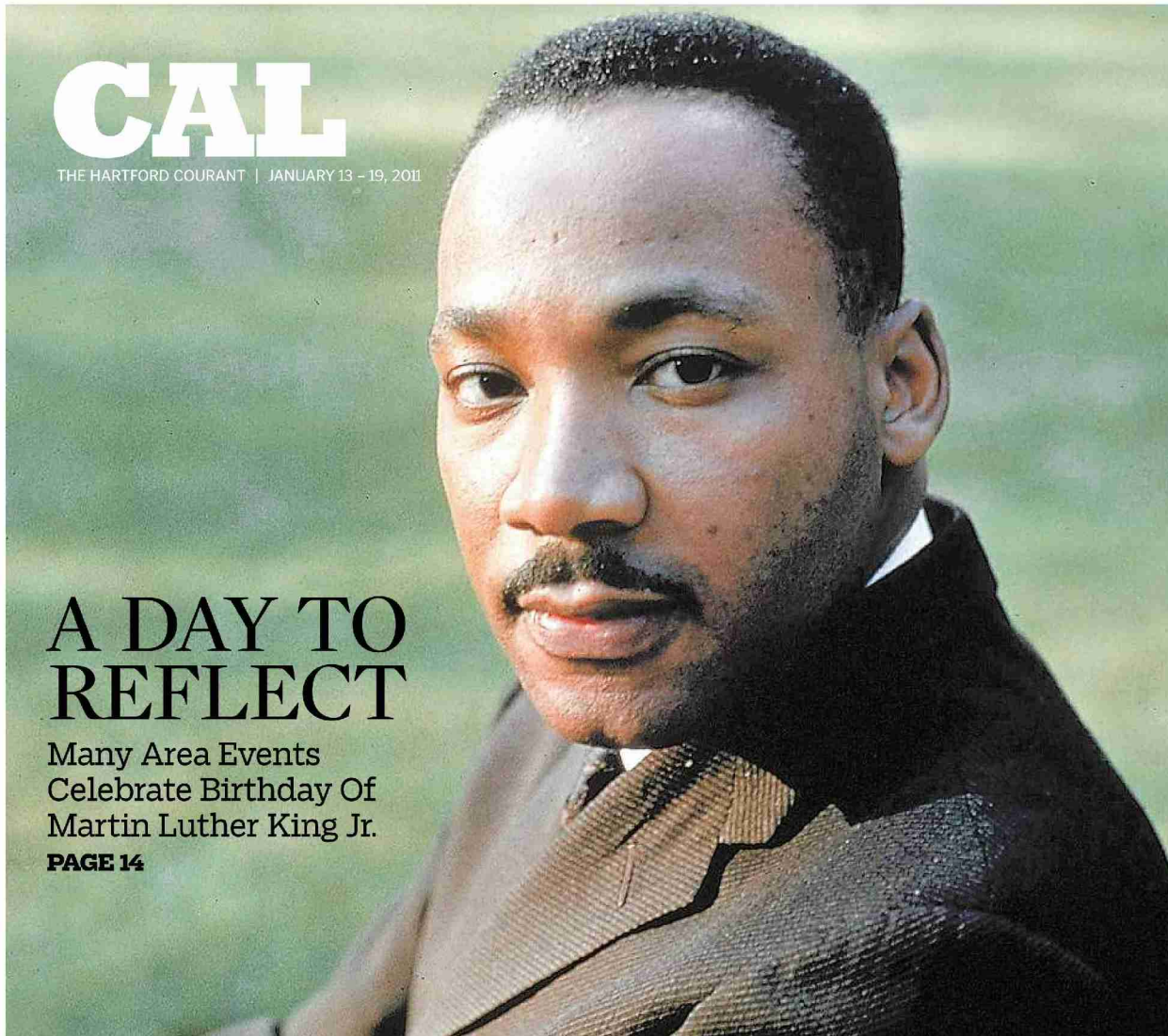

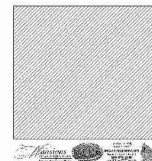

The Yale Peabody Museum hosts its 15th annual free, two-day celebration, "Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s Legacy of Environmental and Social Justice 2011," on Sunday from noon to 4:30 p.m. and Monday from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. It includes dance and music performances, storytelling, "Stop the Violence: Teens Standing Up for Change" workshops, an open mike, an Afro-Caribbean folk-doll workshop and a poetry slam. On Friday, visit **Old Sturbridge Village**, 1 Old Sturbridge Village Road, Sturbridge, Mass., for "Honoring a Slave Heroine: The Mumbet Story." East Hartford resident, storyteller and museum educator Tammy Denease will tell the tale of how Elizabeth "Mumbet" Freeman won her freedom in a 1781 court case that later inspired the decision to end slavery throughout Massachusetts. Ice skating, sledding, sleigh rides and crafts will also be available. Admission is \$20, \$18 seniors ages 65 and older. Children are admitted free through Jan. 31. A DAY TO CELEBRATE

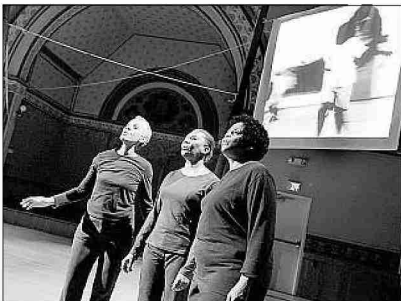
